Details Responsibility Provost and Vice-President (Academic) The proposed Agrology Technologist Upgrade Certificate (Non-credit) is The Purpose of the Proposal is (please be specific) designed to provide specialized training, skills acquisition and knowledge for environmental professionals working within, or seeking to work within the field of agrology and aligned science. The certificate has been designed to meet the educational and professional practice areas missing for those AIA members (current and potential) working at a technician level. These students will have completed an applied science diploma or degree at various colleges and universities within Alberta, but are missing course work to elevate their professional status. Completion of the certificate will provide these professionals with a unique pathway to advance their agrology status (from technician to full professional level) and provide additional professional development and career advancement opportunities. The Alberta Institute of Agrology (AIA) fully supports the proposed Certificate as an education pathway for current and future agrology technicians to achieve a senior level of professional agrology within the association. The part-time, non-credit courses within the proposed certificate specifically cover courses applicable to current practice areas within agrology, a regulated industry in Alberta and Canada. The courses currently exist within the Environmental Studies area of the Faculty of Extension and demonstrate an evolution of education for lifelong learning and career enhancement.

Executive Summary (outline the specific item – and remember your audience)	The courses included within the proposed Certificate also include specific content related to Indigenous consultation and traditional ecological knowledge as relevant to aspects of soil, water, and land development as mandated at the provincial and federal levels, and in acknowledgement of our vital and vibrant Indigenous community partners.
	The Environmental Resource Management (ERM) Non-credit Certificate from the Faculty of Extension began in 1998. This cornerstone certificate was established to address the training needs within the varied and vibrant environmental industry. The area has grown into Environmental Studies (ES) offering four additional certificates within environmental studies: Land Reclamation, Soil Science, Water Resource Management, and Environmental Remediation (launched in 2019).
	Agrologists are part of the 'Pro 10' working group in Alberta and are professionally accredited by the AIA at either a technician or full professional level to provide 'sign off' on various environmental projects at the government level. The AIA represent working, professional Agrologists and are mandated by the government of Alberta to self- govern and regulate their working professionals based on practice areas, education, competency, and experience criteria.
	Currently the ES program area within the Faculty of Extension offers 13 - AIA recognized courses for professionals to complete educational requirements pre and post accreditation. These courses have been developed to meet the needs of working Agrologists and environmental professionals while aligning learning outcomes with practice standards common in the industry. The proposed certificate will be comprised of (a minimum of) 8 of these courses with individual course selection offered to students to maximize their learning. Approximately 40% of course enrollment in these AIA recognized courses come directly from AIA members (current and potential).
	The AIA has committed to fully support the Agrology Technologist Upgrade Certificate as it answers a desire from agrology technicians for a pathway to expanded professional accreditation, working knowledge, and career advancement. No other program in Alberta currently exists to bridge an applied science degree to full professional agrology accreditation on a flexible, part-time basis. This program would offer unique, relevant and recognized education for AIA members and environmental professionals.
	AIA members work and live throughout Alberta and this certificate as proposed would attract students from both urban and rural settings. This would further support the economy, industry, and workers across Alberta as a unique method of educational and career advancement. Providing bridging for prior education both internal and external to the UA would also enhance the professional development and lifelong learning endeavors of the University and Faculty.

	The AIA estimates almost 400 current agrology technicians would be eligible for this bridging certificate with numbers growing in accordance to graduation of future technicians with applied science degrees. While local and national competition does exist at the single course, for-credit diploma, and masters levels of education; non-credit professional development education opportunities in this format do not currently exist and are limited with respect to content, delivery and flexibility. This provides the Faculty with a market edge for an in-demand content area supported by industry. The ERM Advisory Committee fully supports the creation, expansion, and evolution of courses for environmental professionals including the proposed Certificate. Annual Committee meetings provide feedback and strategic guidance from industry representatives working within environmentally focused private companies, government agencies, consultants, aligned education and professional associations, and accredited professionals.
	Additional stakeholder engagement includes feedback from an environmental scan (2016), industry focus group (2018), and letters of support as included in this proposal. This feedback supports the proposed certificate as an expedited, relevant, flexible education option for working students seeking personal and professional development. As the courses currently exist within the Faculty's ES program area, the proposed certificate could be launched in the fall of 2020, with no need for annual governance review.

Alberta Institute of Agrology (AIA) to provide current and future agrology technicians with an educational pathway to a senior level of professional agrology.
The courses within the proposed certificate specifically cover courses applicable to current practice areas within agrology; a regulated industry in Alberta and Canada. The courses currently exist within ES; with two requiring expansion and redevelopment to meet the 3-credit/39-hour duration requirement from the AIA.
The proposed Agrology Technologist Upgrade certificate program will provide specialized training, skills acquisition and knowledge for environmental professionals working within, or seeking to work within the field of agrology and aligned science. The certificate has been designed to meet the educational and professional practice areas missing for those AIA members (current and potential) working at a technician level. These students will have completed an applied science diploma or degree at various colleges and universities within Alberta, but are missing additional course work to elevate their professional status. Completion of the certificate will provide these professionals with a unique pathway to advance their agrology status (from technician to full professional level) and provide additional professional development and career advancement opportunities.

Rationale for request

Agrologists are part of the 'Pro 10' working group in Alberta and are professionally accredited by the AIA at either a technician or full professional level to provide 'sign off' on various environmental projects at the government level. The AIA represent working, professional Agrologists and have been mandated by the government of Alberta to self-govern and regulate their working professionals based on practice areas, education, competency, and experience criteria. Currently the ES program area within the Faculty of Extension offers 13 - AIA recognized courses for professionals to complete educational requirements pre and post accreditation. Approximately 40% of course enrollment in these AIA recognized courses come directly from AIA members (current and potential).

The AIA has committed to fully support the Agrology Technologist Upgrade Certificate as it answers a clear desire from agrology technicians for a pathway to expanded professional accreditation, working knowledge, and career advancement. No other program in Alberta currently exists to bridge an applied science degree to full professional agrology accreditation on a flexible, part-time basis, and this program would offer unique, relevant and recognized education for AIA members.

AIA members work and live throughout Alberta and this certificate as proposed would attract students from both urban and rural settings. This would further support the economy, industry, and workers across Alberta as a unique method of educational and career advancement. Providing bridging for prior education both internal and external to the UA would also enhance the professional development and lifelong learning endeavors of the University and Faculty.

The AIA estimates almost 800 current agrology technicians would be eligible for this bridging certificate with numbers growing in accordance to graduation of future technicians with applied science diplomas and degrees. While local and national competition does exist at the single course, for-credit diploma, and masters levels of education; non-credit professional development education opportunities in this format do not currently exist and are limited with respect to content, delivery and flexibility. This provides the Faculty with a market edge for an in-demand content area supported by industry.

APPENDIX A

Program Name: Agrology Technologist Upgrade Certificate

Proposed program description:

This certificate will provide a bridging opportunity for those working at a technician level of agrology and possessing an applied science diploma or degree. Completion of the certificate will provide agrology technicians with equivalent education to secure full professional agrologist status with the AIA; in compliance with current government guidelines. This elevation of professional status will provide Agrologists with career advancement and professional development not currently available with any other institution.

The courses will be offered in both in-person and online delivery via Faculty of Extension's Learning Engagement Office and classroom spaces. Course registration, record keeping and graduation procedures will be administered by the Faculty and program area including issuance of UA parchment upon successful certificate completion.

Audience: Primarily aimed at professionals working as agrology technicians as accredited by the Alberta Institute of Agrologists.

Program Hours: 312 Grading: Graded Course Format: In-person & online course delivery

Program At A Glance

- 8 required courses (13 courses available)
- May be completed within 1-2 years of part-time study

The Agrology Technologist Upgrade certificate program is comprised of eight required courses. Each of the courses is designed to stand alone in providing continuing and professional education for those working within the environmental industry, including but not limited to Agrologists. Each course is offered individually, but learners who desire a comprehensive skill set may complete all to earn a Certificate and several options exist within environmental studies to provide students with choice, access and flexibility to suit their individual professional development needs.

APPENDIX B

Agrology Technologist Upgrade Certificate Courses:

EXERM 4256 Applied Hydrology (39 hours) --or--

• This course will introduce the practice of surface water hydrology as water plays a role in the development of most human activities. Various land phase hydrologic processes will be described. Methods of development of intensity-duration-frequency curves for rainfall, estimation of rainfall at ungauged locations, stream flow measurement methods, flood frequency analysis, regional frequency analysis for estimating stream flows at ungauged locations and risk assessment in hydrologic design will be discussed. Approximate methods for estimating storm water storage requirements for urban development and various hydrologic and hydraulic modes used in the professional domain will be introduced. Based calculations within various hydrologic procedures as required for addressing surface water hydrology issues will also be covered.

EXERM 4291 Applied Hydrogeology in Alberta (39 hours)

• The course will introduce the practice of hydrogeology as generally applied in Alberta. Three areas of hydrogeology will be explored, with emphasis on conditions in Alberta. These areas include:(1) Hydrogeological Site Assessment, (2) Groundwater Resource Evaluation and Management, and (3) Groundwater Monitoring. Topics will include principles and practices of contaminated site assessment, regulatory considerations, conceptual models, environmental risk management, and groundwater remediation. Methods of characterizing regional baseline hydrogeology, groundwater resource quantity and quality, and groundwater vulnerability will be covered, along with discussion of issues such as groundwater modelling, watershed management, groundwater-surface water interaction, and implications of climate change. Also considered will be the key elements of designing an effective groundwater monitoring program both on a local and a regional scale.

EXERM 4285 Environmental Site Assessment & Management (39 hours) -or--

• This course is an introduction to common practices within the management of contaminated sites in Alberta. The three part approach for the assessment management of contaminated sites will be covered including: Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment, Phase 2 Environmental Site Assessment, and Risk Management Plans. Alberta Site Assessment standards and the Alberta Tier 1 and 2 soil and Groundwater Remediation Guidelines will also be covered. Additional topics will include differences between risk management and site remediation with examination of cost considerations within various site remediation components. Case studies will be used to provide a focus on contamination sources, characterization, transportation, and environmental fate in the environment.

EXERM 4286 Remediation Technologies (39 hours)

• This course will provide the key points associated with remediation of contaminated soil and groundwater utilizing different remediation technologies. The main processes within remediation (engineering, physical, chemical, biological, and thermal) will be covered. Decision-making factors for choosing the appropriate remediation technology for each site is a focal point in this course. Descriptions, applicability, advantages, limitations, time frames, potential health and safety issues, and cost of various technologies will also be studied. Case studies of contaminated sites with special emphasis on remediation technologies currently available for handling such sites in Alberta will be explored.

2 of 3 advanced soil science courses:

• EXERM 4281 Applied Soil Physics (39 hours)

• This course will introduce students to the basic concepts of applied soil physics, with an emphasis on the quantitative aspects. Basic physical aspects of both the solid and liquid phases of soils as well as how water is held by soils and how it moves through soils, will be covered. The course will examine the link between the soil water regime and processes within the hydrologic cycle, with emphasis on infiltration and the soil physical properties affecting this key hydrologic process. Soil management challenges that involve soil physics and how to manipulate soils to enhance their physical properties will also be examined.

• EXERM 4282 Applied Soil Chemistry (39 hours)

• This course will introduce students to the soil principal reactive chemical constituents and their processes. Topics will include an introduction to the soil solid and liquid components (chemical composition, mineralogy, organic matter and soil solution); and description of important soil chemical processes and their relevance to environmental and agricultural applications (mineral stability and weathering, oxidation-reduction, surface adsorption and exchange, colloidal behaviour and soil acidity and salinity).

• EXERM 4284 Applied Soil Fertility (39 hours)

• The course will address the relevance of soil fertility including the importance of soil fertility in plant growth and nutrient uptake by crops. The agronomic significance of soil physical, chemical, and biological properties as they pertain to soil fertility will be discussed. Topics will include major nutrients, as well as secondary and micronutrients, and corresponding fertilizers. The course will also examine soil fertility evaluation: soil testing; the backbone of soil fertility and problems soils (acid and saline soils). Soil management challenges including fertilizer application, water use efficiency, interactions amount nutrients, and economics of plant-nutrient use will be addressed.

EXERM 4280 Wetland Delineation, Classification & Assessment (39 hours) --or--

Through lecture, classroom and field exercises, students can expect to learn methods to identify
wetlands and delineate their boundaries based on indicators of vegetation, soils, and hydrology, in
addition to conducting desktop delineations through aerial photo interpretation. Other topics to be
covered include wetland classification, impact and assess reports, and relative-value assessments.
Prior knowledge of soils and vegetation is helpful, but not required.

EXERM 4290 Restoring & Creating Wetlands (39 hours)

• This course will cover the concepts, applications, planning procedures, and implementation strategies involved in the successful construction of wetlands that look and function like natural wetlands. Students can expect to learn about site selection, testing soil texture, selecting construction techniques, establishing designed hydrology and vegetation aspects, and working with heavy equipment operators. Topics in peatland restoration will also be covered. The course will be offered as a combination of mandatory hands-on experience in the field, in addition to classroom lecture.

EXERM 4264 Land Reclamation Fundamentals (39 hours) --or-

• This course will cover concepts related to successful land reclamation through the effective application of soil and vegetative science principles. Topics for this course include: Land use, types of disturbances, regulations governing land reclamation, soil testing, handling and storage, site preparation, plant community ecology, vegetation selection and planting, monitoring, and determinates of success within reclamation. This course will also cover special considerations such as erosion, soil and plant pathogens, amendments, and weeds. Basic knowledge of soils and vegetation is recommended, but not required.

EXERM 4265 Applied Vegetative Reclamation (39 hours)

• This course will cover revegetation standards, practices, and commonly used methods to reestablish native plant communities as part of the reclamation process for disturbed sites on public lands of Alberta. Topics will also include planning, species selection and sourcing native plant material, site preparation and establishment methods, maintenance, monitoring, and criteria for success. Plant identification of native plants, weeds, and invasive species will also be introduced.

*EXERM 4307 Introduction to Soils (to be expanded to 39 hours)

• This course includes an overview of soil formation and soil classification with emphasis given to soils of Western Canada. Additional topics will include basic soil chemical, physical and biological properties and processes. Soil make-up and why air and water are important components of soil will also be included, water holding and transmission, soil nutrient cycling by microorganisms, effects of salt on soil properties, and soil interactions within ecosystems will also be covered. Course concepts will provide a broad understanding of soil science as preparation for more specialized soil and environmental sciences courses.

*EXERM 4268 Environmental Impact Assessments (to be expanded to 39 hours)

• Learn about the process and applications of the environmental impact assessment (EIA) in the context of provincial and federal legislation and regulations. Discuss the requirements for public and Indigenous consultation involved in gathering stakeholder input into the EIA process, as well as topics such as Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK). Explore the components of the EIA that may lead to approval conditions and requirements, including how to address these in a way that sets the stage for future corporate action and government oversight.

*Note: Course description for EXERM 4268 will be updated as above pending Extension Faculty Council approval.

APPENDIX C

Faculty of Extension

Advisory Committee Terms of Reference

PREAMBLE

One of the ways that the Faculty of Extension assures that its programming is current, relevant, and of excellent quality is through a Program Advisory Committee system. The Program Advisory Committee is the principal means for involving program stakeholders, soliciting expert advice and counsel, maximizing responsiveness to student and client needs and demands, and contributing to developing and incorporating the findings of contemporary scholarship and research into programming.

PURPOSE

The Program Advisory Committee will provide member's advice to the program's Team Leads and the Faculty of Extension Council. The committee will:

- serve as subject matter experts
- assist in the development and review of program curricula to ensure relevance, high quality, and competitiveness
- provide advice and direction on course structure, content, evaluation, program strengths, weaknesses or gaps in programming
- provide effective marketing and program profile development relating to current trends, issues, and ideas relevant to the program
- act as a link to professional and industry partners

MEMBERSHIP

1. The Committee will consist of 5 - 10 members.

2. Membership of the Committee normally should consist of a minimum of one member from each of the following categories:

- Program staff
- Academic Staff
- Instructors
- Students
- Professional/Industry partners

3. Appointments will normally be for no more than three, 2-year terms (total of 6 years) with approximately one-half of the appointments being made or renewed each year. However, upon the recommendation of the program's Team Lead, the Dean may approve an extension.

- 4. Members may be appointed by their respective organisations or by the program's Team Leads
- 5. The committee will be chaired by Assistant, Dean, Academic or delegate.
- 6. Secretarial and administrative support will be provided by the program areas within the Faculty of

Extension

7. Ad Hoc committees such as working groups or task forces may be established as required. Membership of such groups may be recruited from outside the Committee.

MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE

- 1. The Committee will normally meet once a year.
- 2. Additional meetings may be called at the request of the chair.

3. No remuneration will be paid to Committee members. Out-of-pocket expenses such as parking or required travel may be reimbursed.

MEMBER BENEFITS AND RECOGNITION

- Opportunity to influence the nature of university extension programs to better serve the needs of students, organisations, and the community.
- Opportunity to exchange ideas, experiences, and information with peers who share expertise and interest in this field.
- Opportunity for public service and professional recognition.

David Lloyd and I would like to thank you for taking the time to meet with us on August 21st to discuss the course offerings at the University of Alberta, Faculty of Extension. As you are aware, members of the Agrology profession in Alberta provide professional services within the environmental and agricultural sectors of the Alberta economy. The Alberta Institute of Agrologists (AIA) is the regulatory body responsible for issuing practice permits, overseeing, guiding and directing the Agrology profession to assure the public that Agrologists providing these professional services are qualified to do so.

ALBERTA INSTITUTE OF AGROLOGISTS

We appreciate the course offerings you have provided to our professional members. These are subject areas that mirror exactly what is taught in current full-term undergraduate courses by post-secondary education institutions and therefore enable our members to take these subject offerings in a short and compressed five-day period as opposed to a four-month term. We anticipate continued and growing demand for Extension courses directly related to the practice of Agrology. The Competence Committee of the AIA routinely refers these courses to Professional Agrologists (P.Ag), Registered Technologists in Agrology (RTAg), Agrologists in Training (AIT) and Agrology Technologists in Training (ATT) who need to upgrade their educational backgrounds. The Competence Committee requires courses to be equivalent to a 3-credit 39-hour university course to meet the knowledge requirements of the Agrology practice standards.

The courses offered through the Environmental Studies program provide solid training in Soils, Water and Environmental Assessments and Technologies. The one area that our registered members look for additional training is in the area of Plant Science, Vegetation Taxonomy and Plant Physiology. These subject areas would be a valuable addition to your course offerings and would be attractive to members of the Agrology Profession. We would like to encourage the Faculty of Extension to pursue offering courses related to the vegetation science aspects of Agrology.

We also would encourage the Faculty of Extension to consider offering courses as an online course where travel time and expenses for attending a weeklong course is not required. Taking time from work and incurring travel expenses beyond tuition costs becomes a barrier for some of our members not located in

the Edmonton area. Online courses would increase access to educational training for Agrologists across Alberta as well as Agrologists living within other provinces. Such courses would need to ensure the same rigour, duration, learning objectives, evaluation standards, and assurance that assignments and examinations are in fact completed by the registered student. We understand that some courses are more easily offered in an online format than others; however, we hope that increased offerings of online courses for Agrologists would be something the Faculty of Extension could embrace.

An additional topic of discussion in our meeting was related to the development of an "Agrology certificate" program. We have members who have a 3-year applied degree from various colleges throughout Alberta and Canada. These applied degrees are one year short of the educational requirements for the professional designation (P.Ag.). As a result, these members are registered as Registered Technologists in Agrology (RTAg). Many of these members wish to obtain the professional Agrologist designation rather than maintain their technologist designation. In order to accomplish this, these members must upgrade by taking at least 8 additional 3-credit courses to achieve the equivalent of a 4-year 120-credit degree which is required for the professional designation. If the Faculty of Extension could offer an "Agrology certificate" consisting of 8 courses out of the course offerings currently in place, the AIA could then justify awarding the P.Ag to these members who are currently registered as an RTAg. We believe there would be a significant portion of our RTAg membership who would take advantage of such a certificate program. We are routinely asked by RTAgs how to advance from the RTAg to the P.Ag designation. We would be fully supportive of such a program and would consider providing seed financing support for such development. We would be pleased to discuss this idea and funding support further.

We would like to thank the Faculty of Extension for being the premiere venue for professional development opportunities for Agrologists in Alberta. The connection to the University of Alberta, the development of course content equivalent to regular degree programs, and the credibility of the Faculty and its teaching staff is very much appreciated by the AIA and the profession.

	The change in level (72% to 70%) is justified by the difficulty of education students to achieve level B2 strong, thus preventing students from beginning their field practicum. The 12.5 pass mark is for the Oral comprehension Component only. For the other three components, the pass mark must be at minimum 18/25 but sufficiently high cumulatively to attain an overall pass mark of 70%.
	The change in the pass mark for the Oral comprehension Component (12.5/25 instead of 18/25) is justified by the fact that many other parameters (such as accent and speed of delivery, flow, vocabulary, cultural references, quality of recording, etc.) completely distinct from French language competency, interfered with student success and therefore does not seem to be a good indicator of it.
	The section "Acceptable proof of language proficiency equivalent to DELF level "strong B2" has also been revised : - Internal (in-house) tests (such as <i>Les examens de langue du</i> <i>Baccalauréat international (IB), Test de langue du Cégep,</i> <i>Advanced Placement Tests)</i> should not be considered as

Where an individual department's requirements vary from the Faculty minimum, this will be specified in each individual department entry in <u>BA Honors Requirements</u>. Students must also meet promotion requirements as outlined in individual department entries during their final year.

NOTES:

a. Students who do not meet the promotion requirements may not continue in Honors but may transfer to another program in the Faculty if they meet the requirements for that program.

<u>3.</u> Graduation Requirements: In order to graduate from the BA Honors, students must have:
 a. ★120 successfully completed, which satisfy the program requirements

b. Graduation GPA of 3.0 on the last ★60 completed at the University of Alberta.

c. 3.3 on all courses applied to the major completed at the University of Alberta.

d. Present good academic standing and meet all promotion requirements outlined in (2) above.

e. Graduation requirements for individual programs or departments may exceed the Faculty minimum. Where an individual department's requirements vary from the Faculty minimum, this will be specified in each individual department entry in BA Honors Requirements.

4. Graduation with First-Class Honors:

Departments shall choose one of the following options as their policy for determining First-Class Honors. (Refer to Departmental entries <u>BA Honors</u> <u>Requirements</u>)

a. A minimum average of 3.7 on all senior-level courses in the major <u>completed at the University of</u> <u>Alberta,</u> and an average of at least 3.5 on all courses in the last \star 30 completed at the University of Alberta.

b. A minimum average of 3.7 on all courses in the two final years in the major and an average of at least 3.5 in all courses in the two final years. The two final years shall be defined as the last ± 60 .

NOTES:

In the calculation for the Graduation GPA and the Graduation with First-Class Honors GPA:

a. Courses with non-numeric grades (CR/NC) may be included in the credit count(s), but not in the calculation of the average.

	b. Only courses used to meet specific degree requirements will be used in the calculation; failed courses and courses that are considered extra to degree are not included.
	 c. If it is necessary to go back further than the last two Fall/Winter terms to reach the minimum ★60 or ★30 as required above, the full previous term will be included (not breaking up a term) until the minimum is reached.
	d. Typically only courses that are taken at the University of Alberta are used in the calculation of the Graduate GPA and/or the major course GPA; however, in some circumstances, the Faculty may choose to include courses/grades from outside of the University of Alberta, at its discretion
4. 
