The Purpose of the Proposal is (please be specific)	To introduce a course designator (FOLK) for the folklore courses taught currently taught under the designator MLCS in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies.
Executive Summary (outline the specific item – and remember your audience)	The new course designator FOLK will identify the FOLK courses as a connected set of courses dedicated to Folklore Studies, and provide a direct identification between the course content and the course designator. It will also separate folklore courses from the MLCS courses that have a very specific purpose: MLCS courses either constitute general requirements that are common for all undergraduate majors in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies or they are courses from various disciplines that focus on a cross-cultural perspective. Assigning a FOLK designator to all folklore courses will be consistent with the other groups of lecture courses taught in English in the MLCS program which have their own course designators (C LIT, LA ST, SCAND, and SLAV). This change will make the fact that the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies offers folklore classes more obvious to students. It will also show that all these courses are connected. Logically, there is no reason to have folklore courses under the MLCS designator which is used for rotating special topics courses with a cross-cultural perspective. Those MLCS courses are not based in one specific discipline, may have variable topics, and are not necessarily offered on a continuing basis. This change would also make it possible for students to focus on Folklore within the new major in MLCS.
	Folklore studies build and sustain a culture and community of inclusivity and diversity, giving an opportunity to students to learn firsthand how knowledge of world cultures translates into action for the true public good; this area of studies directly connects diverse communities to the students' learning and research.



	The new courses with the FOLK designator replace the existing courses: • MLCS 204: Forms of Folklore • MLCS 205: History of Folklore Studies • MLCS 275: Folklore and Film • MLCS 375: Folklore and the Internet
	MLCS 405: Contemporary Folklore Scholarship and Canadian Folklore
	Courses with FOLK designator to be offered Fall/Winter 2020-21.
	Administrative and teaching costs are already covered as the above- mentioned courses have been taught for many years. Administration/ownership of this course will remain with MLCS.
	Next steps: The courses with the new prefix will be advertised in the Arts Newsletter and promoted at open houses, on social media, and within existing courses. The Department will advise students by email, specifically students in MLCS. The Department publicizes all of its courses on its website and will continue to do so with the new prefix.

At present, there are five courses with MLCS designator dedicated to folklore studies: MLCS 204: Forms of Folklore, MLCS 205: History of Folklore Studies, MLCS 275: Folklore and Film, MLCS 375: Folklore and the Internet, MLCS 405: Contemporary Folklore Scholarship and Canadian Folklore. The proposed change introduces a new course designator (FOLK) for the folklore courses. This change will identify the FOLK courses as a connected set of courses dedicated to Folklore Studies, and provide a direct identification between the course content and the course designator. It will also separate folklore courses from the courses with MLCS designator that have a very specific purpose: they constitute general requirements for all undergraduate majors in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies. In this way, it will be consistent with the other groups of lecture courses taught in English in the MLCS degree, which have their own course designators (C LIT, LA ST, SCAND, and SLAV).

Currently all folklore courses are very popular among students, with steadily high enrollments (up to 100 students in each class offered).

MLCS is the only department that offers folklore courses; no similar courses are offered elsewhere at the University of Alberta.

The proposed FOLK designator will better reflect the content, and will create a clear pathway for students interested in folklore. It will also constitute an important step towards building a stronger folklore program in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies.

The Purpose of the Proposal is	To create new course designations ARTE (Arts) and LITT (Littérature),

Executive Summary (outline the specific item – and remember your audience)	The proposal to create new course designators in Faculté Saint-Jean stems from the ongoing curricular reform and innovation in the Arts Section.
	As Faculté Saint-Jean is revamping its BA two new course designators are needed: LITT (Littérature) and ARTE (Arts).
	The LITT designator will allow to better distinguish literature courses from linguistic courses (LINGQ) and from French-language courses (FRANC). Courses with the FRANC abbreviation are language courses intended for students who need to upgrade their French in order to pursue their studies at Faculté Saint-Jean and are part of the curriculum of all Faculté Saint-Jean's students. Courses labeled LITT or LINGQ belong to the Major or Minor in Language and Francophone Cultures.
	The ARTE abbreviation is needed for non-disciplinary or transdisciplinary courses offered in the revamped BA. It will be used for example for two of the basic requirements ("tronc commun") courses of the BA: ARTE 101 (Research and Academic Writing) and ARTE 125 (Reasoning and Critical Thinking). Both courses are non-disciplinary courses and are compulsory for all students of the BA. Labeling them as ARTE will clearly indicate that they are foundational courses and that they do not belong to any specific Major or discipline. The ARTE designator will also be used for advanced courses required to complete the BA Honors program, which offers several specializations, as well as for capstone courses of the Individualised Minor. The content of those advanced courses will vary according to the specialization or will be transdisciplinary. As a result, a disciplinary abbreviation is not suitable and the ARTE prefix will be used for such courses.


